A. Catalog Description

A. Subject Matter

2. Research and write about the history of England to 1714.
3. Develop an appreciation for the complexity of both change and continuity over time in English history.
4. Formulate informed conclusions and judgments about the events and people that shaped England from earliest times to 1714.
5. Describe the different cultures that have flourished in England since earliest times and the conflicts between societies.
6. Describe the evolution of concept of "England."
7. Describe the development of institutions such as Parliament and the Church of England.
