I. Course Information:

A. Catalog Description:

The theoretical basis of community health nursing is the focus of the course. Students explore the role of the nurse in the community, in the care of aggregates, and populations at risk. The course includes 56.25 hours in the clinical setting.

B. Additional Course Description:

This course provides a model of nursing service delivery in which "health care" is provided through community diagnosis, health surveillance, and preventive care. Ways to identify major health and environmental problems and to monitor the health status of communities and populations are identified. The goal of creating conditions in which people can be healthy is stressed. Ethical issues that may arise in providing community nursing care are also addressed.
