I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Various topics in human behavior selected by the instructor. May be repeated, when topics differ, for a total of nine hours.

B. Additional Information

This course explores various topics in human behavior. Topics are specific and related to additional theories and concepts beyond existing courses offered. Topics are selected by the instructor and vary by semester. Psychology Majors may enroll in three different topic areas of this course. Students may not repeat a topic for credit. Topics in the past have included: Criminology, Psychology of Addiction, and Adolescent Psychology. Topics will be broadened and expanded through time.

Course work varies, but is often functioning in lecture and seminar fashion with students making or participating in group activity and group discussion or presentation

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate and discuss the topic or theories specific to the seminar.
- 2. Examine facts, contributors or theorists, applicable research, and the integration of the topic to a broader conceptualization of psychology as a science.
- 3. Examine and explain a concept or tenet of the area of psychology explored either in written response or orally.
