A. Catalog Description

Biological and sociological foundations of human sexuality, human reproduction, sexual functioning, psychological sexual disorders, cultural sexual differences, gender roles, stereo-typing, current and controversial topics in sex education, public policy and politics of human sexuality.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Identify sexual disorders and deviant sexual behavior;
2. Identify psychological theories relevant to sexual behavior, including psychoanalytic theories, biological theories, behavioral theories, evolutionary psychology theories, social learning theories, information processing theories, cultural and sociological perspectives, historical context of sexual research and history of sexual behavioral discussions as well as additional physiological sexual response and biological aspects of sexual behavior; and
3. Develop and express a psychological theory specific to sexual behavior and discuss and defend one aspect of their chosen theory.
4. Master appropriate psychological language and vocabulary specific to theories of sexual behavior and sexual psychology.

5. Locate, identify, access and process research specific and current to psychology of sexual behavior, deviant sexual behavior, society/policy issues of sexual behavior in the culture.
