I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

This course offers a panoramic view of Latin American literature, from precolonial times to the literature of today. This course is conducted in Spanish.

1. Apply appropriate Spanish literary terminology in written, interpersonal and presentational communication.
2. Describe the literary movements of Latin America.
3. Compare and contrast how representative authors from individual countries employ different literary genres.
4. Engage critically in questions about Latin America's identity, its colonial legacy, and nation-building.
5. Conduct research and cite secondary sources using MLA standards.
