I. Course Information:

A. Catalog Description

Students will synthesize, integrate, and/or apply their previous knowledge and skills in the creation of a project in Spanish. The emphasis of the capstone experience is to demonstrate mastery rather than acquire new knowledge/skills. At the completion of the course students will share their work with the campus.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Write at an advanced level in Spanish.
- 2. Complete a paper in Spanish using appropriate academic format and language.
- 3. Do research in academic texts/ journals and cite them appropriately.
- 4. Present on the culture and linguistic aspects of a Spanish-speaking region and/or on a literary or historical period of a Spanish-speaking region.

B. University Learning Outcomes (ULOs)

This course enhances student abilities in the following areas:

Analytical Skills

Critical Thinking Skills

Students will identify problems/issues and develop solutions/analysis. Students will analyze a variety of texts for their rhetorical and/or literary features, as well as analyze the rhetorical situation to which the texts they produce respond.
